How is/has your parish engaged in the work of economic justice in your community?

We have an active food pantry that distributes UDSA and non-USDA items provided by the Second Harvest Food Bank, as well as other personal hygiene and household items.

Our Laundry Love program serves a specific need in Kingsport otherwise unaddressed. We provide laundry cards, detergent, and dryer sheets to 50 people each month. This is an adjustment from prepandemic operation, but we have adapted to keep this important ministry functional.

The parish also regularly contributes to KCMC, a local organization that gives financial assistance to people facing eviction or utility cutoff.

Lastly, our discretionary fund is used liberally to provide ad hoc assistance to anyone who might have a need that cannot be met by the aforementioned services.

How is/has your parish engaged in the work of racial justice?

I have personally attended a few protests and vigils hosted by our local Black Lives Matter, and some of our members have participated in the MLK Parade through downtown each year in January (before this year).

Has your parish heard preaching or have you preached about racial justice in the last year? How often and on what topics?

I have addressed different issues from the pulpit, especially this past summer after the murder of George Floyd and Brianna Taylor, and more recently lamenting the the way in which the symbols of white supremacy and christianity often go hand in hand (as evidenced in the capitol on January 6th).

Has your parish engaged in Christian formation about racial justice in the last year? How often, and what age groups and topics?

During this summer I spent considerable time writing about the protests, about racial violence, and the Christian imagination. While we were on "lockdown", this writing was something of a Lenten discipline last year, and the parish received daily reflections from me, often addressing this subject matter. I have also encouraged out people to read and listen to Dr. King's Beyond Vietnam speeches on his holiday, as well as read his Letter From a Birmingham Jail.

We have also begun training for our youth leaders to facilitate the Absalom Jones Center program for our EYG group. We plan to start that sometime this year, hopefully when we can gather in person. This will also be the theme and topic of our youth pilgrimage if that is to happen this year (postponed from last year).

We are currently engaging an ongoing book study, and I hope to incorporate formation on this topic in that venue as well.

SONG is an organization I have donated to in the past, particularly when they do their campaign to post bail for jailed women (Black women are disproportionately affected by the cash bail system, some of them mothers who are separated from children when they cannot post bail). SONG is not the only organization that does this.
